



A LENTEN REFLECTION CONCERNING WORSHIP

Lent gives us an opportunity to reflect, re-connect and repent. Lent is also a wonderful time to find answers to the many questions we have about our faith. One of the basic questions I hear more and more in our current culture is this...

WHY DO WE NEED TO GATHER TO WORSHIP?

We were created to worship God. Whether we are praising Him in an extravagant celebration of joy, a quiet expression of reverence and humility, or out of simple obedience to His voice, our worship is an outward expression of what's going on in the inward heart of mankind. Worship has often been misunderstood as the musical prelude to the sermon, rather than the means by which we, as the people of God, invite the dominion of His Kingdom to be established on earth. The purpose of our worship is to glorify, honor, praise, exalt, and please God. Our worship must show our adoration and loyalty to God for His grace in providing us with the way to escape the bondage of sin, so we can have the salvation He so much wants to give us.

HOW, WHEN and WHERE DO WE WORSHIP?

Since God is the object of our worship, He and He alone has the right to determine how we are to worship Him. Worship is a time when we pay deep, sincere, awesome respect, love, and fear to the one who created us. Our singing, praying, studying His word, giving, and communion are designed by God to bring us closer to Him and to cause us to think more like He thinks, thus becoming more like Him. James 4:8 tells us to, "Draw near to God and He will draw near to you." Our worship not only honors and magnifies God, but it is also for our own edification and strength. Worship helps us develop a God-like and Christ-like character. We become like unto those we admire and worship. When we worship God, we tend to value what God values and gradually take on the characteristics and qualities of God, but never to His level.

To call ourselves children of God, we must be in a constant atmosphere of wanting to learn more and to learn we must be in community with others who are aspiring to draw closer to God. Worship is built and based off coming together in community. We can believe, love and know God but we cannot grow in faith without joining together in community.

Jesus said: Matthew 18:20

For where two or three have gathered together in My name, I am there in their midst."

The guide to worship is based in the beginning chapters of the Old Testament. After giving the Ten Commandments, the Lord gave explicit directions to Moses about building a tabernacle of worship in which He would come to dwell among His people (Exodus 25:8, 9). The people spent a year at Sinai building the tabernacle according to God's pattern and learning how to worship. God's plan for His people's redemption was to be realized through the priestly ministry of worship. In Christ, all believers have become a "royal priesthood" that

we "may proclaim the praises of Him who called [us] out of the darkness unto His marvelous light" (1 Peter 2:9).

But the command to worship did not stop there. We are to this day in covenant with God (promising our obedience to worship Him) and called to be His "chosen people." Through Jesus Christ we have been adopted into his grace.

4 new districts pave way for strategic alignment, diversity, innovation

For the past two years, the Minnesota Conference has piloted having four

district superintendents rather than five—with churches in the Big Waters District shared between North Star, River Valley, Southern Prairie, and Twin Cities superintendents.

Bishop Lanette Plambeck and the Bishop's Leadership Team (BLT) have spent months exploring redistricting possibilities, and they are officially recommending moving to four new districts going forward, each of which will include a mix of urban, suburban, and rural churches. The district lines have been redrawn, with the new lines moving through and across what is now the Twin Cities district. All churches currently in the Big Waters District will have a dedicated superintendent under this new plan, which will go to the 2024 Annual Conference Session in May for a vote and take effect July 1. The BLT addresses key adaptive questions and serves as a think-tank of sorts for discerning new strategies, with a focus on creativity, generative ideas, and leaning into new ways of being church. The team continues the work of the Transitional Table, a former think tank that was called together in June 2022 by then-interim Bishop David Bard, and intentionally includes some members of that team. The initial impetus for going to four districts was to reduce costs in recognition of financial realities facing the conference, but there are additional benefits that have shaped the shift as well: creating strategic alignment around our shared mission, addressing the metro-Greater Minnesota divide that conference constituents have named in various listening sessions, and investing in innovation. The change provides new opportunities to live into our gospel imperatives to grow in love of God and neighbor, reach new people, and heal a broken world.

Each superintendent will have approximately the same number of churches in their care and will work with the full breadth of church sizes and geographies across the state—thus enabling new partnerships and learning opportunities within districts. "Realigning the districts gives us a great opportunity for collaboration across the

state of Minnesota," said Rev. Michelle Hargrave, who now superintends the River Valley District. "Each superintendent having the opportunity to work with rural, town and country, suburban, and urban churches is going to change the way we work together and the way we think about ministry."

The redistricting is a continuation of the work of the Transitional Table, whose members reported at the 2023 Annual Conference that they were coalescing around the idea of four permanent districts, each of which encompasses both rural and urban churches, and renaming the role of "district superintendent" to "conference superintendent"—which is also part of the new plan.

Under the Book of Discipline, an annual conference chooses its number of districts, and the Appointive Cabinet draws the district lines. Bishop Lanette chose to expand that process by entrusting the redrawing of the district lines to the Bishop's Leadership Team, with input from the Appointive Cabinet. A sub-group of the BLT was tasked with exploring how to consolidate the five current districts into four. They mapped out a variety of possible boundaries based on rivers, highways, and population density—and ultimately recommended the model that uses population density. In the coming months, there will be an opportunity for Minnesota United Methodists to be involved in the process of naming the four new districts. Something that appealed to BLT members is that each new district will encompass the richness in diversity that's visible throughout the state: woodlands, prairies, lakes, and rivers, as well as a wide variety of languages and cultures.

Bishop Lanette said when she visited each of the current districts last year, both clergy and laity voiced concern about a perceived disconnect that seemed to separate the Twin Cities metro area from the rest of the conference. Their input motivated her to design a way forward that would help address that gap. "I believe the proposed redistricting provides an opportunity to close that gap and invites each district into new and renewed relationships that will foster unity, support, innovation, and mission effectiveness within the Minnesota Conference," she said. "I am looking forward to the varied ways each district will embrace a new way forward and embody what it means to grow as disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."
