# Weekly Worship studies



November 1, 2020 Read Revelation 7:9-17

#### The Great Multitude in White Robes

9 After this I looked, and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb. They were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands. 10 And they cried out in a loud voice:

"Salvation belongs to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb."

11 All the angels were standing around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures. They fell down on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, 12 saying:

"Amen! Praise and glory and wisdom and thanks and honor and power and strength be to our God for ever and ever.

Amen!"

13 Then one of the elders asked me, "These in white robes—who are they, and where did they come from?"
14 I answered, "Sir, you know."

And he said, "These are they who have come out of the great tribulation; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. 15 Therefore, "they are before the throne of God and serve him day and night in his temple; and he who sits on the throne will shelter them with his presence. 16 'Never again will they hunger; never again will they thirst. The sun will not beat down on them,' nor any scorching heat. 17 For the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd; 'he will lead them to springs of living water.' 'And God will wipe away every tear from their eyes."

The author of Revelation draws on a lot of images from the Old Testament that would have been familiar to his audience.

Read Isaiah 4:2-6 and Isaiah 40:10-11 before reading the passage from Revelation one more time.

How do the Isaiah passages help illuminate the Revelation passage? [They connect Isaiah's vision with John's vision. This is the work that God has continued to do.]

What is similar? What is different? [Similarities include the image of God as a shepherd providing refuge for those going through difficulty. Differences include that Isaiah was writing to give hope to the Jewish people. John includes a vision that encompasses the whole world (7:9).]

How would you define a "saint"?

How might this passage contribute to your definition? [From verse 9: "standing before the throne and the lamb" = focus on what is important; robed in white = having been cleansed by the forgiveness offered through Jesus; palm branches = also a symbol of cleansing, victory, and celebration; from verse 10: tell about God's salvation; from 12: they sing about all that God has done; from verse 15 and following: they look forward to experiencing God's abundance.]

It is common to think about "saints" as holier-than-thou and as the rare few. By virtue of our baptism, we are all called toward being saints.

Do you think of yourself as called to be a saint? Why or why not?

What difference would it make if you thought of yourself as a saint?

How would washing robes "in the blood of the Lamb" (v. 14) make their robes white? [It wouldn't! It is just another hint that throughout the book John is using symbolism to convey his message.] Blood, as indicated in Leviticus, represents life. These "saints," as represented by their clothing, are those who have "put on" Jesus to use the apostle Paul's words.

What might it mean to put on Christ?

What might it look like to live as those who "wear white robes" in our everyday lives today?

On this All Saint Day, who do you remember who put on Christ for you or displayed the life of Christ?

How might you continue to live into your call to be a saint?

#### Let us Pray:

God of our fathers and mothers in the faith, you have been a refuge to those in distress. Through your Holy Spirit, many have been empowered and strengthened to praise you when all else seemed dark and chaotic. May that same Holy Spirit breathe new life into us, that we might be your witnesses to those we come in contact with this coming week. Amen.

The Shout at Midnight

November 8, 2020

#### Read Matthew 25:1-13

#### The Parable of the Ten Virgins

25 "At that time the kingdom of heaven will be like ten virgins who took their lamps and went out to meet the bridegroom. 2 Five of them were foolish and five were wise. 3 The foolish ones took their lamps but did not take any oil with them. 4 The wise ones, however, took oil in jars along with their lamps. 5 The bridegroom was a long time in coming, and they

all became drowsy and fell asleep. 6 "At midnight the cry rang out: 'Here's the bridegroom! Come out to meet him!'
7 "Then all the virgins woke up and trimmed their lamps. 8
The foolish ones said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil; our lamps are going out.' 9 "'No,' they replied, 'there may not be enough for both us and you. Instead, go to those who sell oil and buy some for yourselves.' 10 "But while they were on their way to buy the oil, the bridegroom arrived. The virgins who were ready went in with him to the wedding banquet.
And the door was shut. 11 "Later the others also came. 'Lord, Lord,' they said, 'open the door for us!' 12 "But he replied, 'Truly I tell you, I don't know you.' 13 "Therefore keep watch, because you do not know the day or the hour.

In this parable, Jesus is using a common scene from a wedding ceremony. Bridesmaids would leave the bride at night, to meet the groom. They would then accompany the groom, whenever he decided (perhaps shouting his intentions at midnight), back to the bride's house. They would then travel back to the groom's father's house for a ceremony, and festivities that could last up to a week with many in the village in attendance.

With those considerations, do you understand the response of the bridesmaids in verse 9? [Besides just missing the wedding ceremonies, these bridesmaids are also risking public shaming. It would be very risky not to have the oil needed for the lamps.]

Have you ever had friends or family members do something so embarrassing that you didn't want to identify with them? How do you think that same dynamic is in the words of the reply in verse 12? [It is not that the speaker didn't actually know them by name; their actions were so foolish that he did not recognize why they had acted so foolishly. This added to their shame. In addition, they missed out on all the festivities.]

As Christians, we are taught to be generous. In Acts 2:44-45, we see a model of the church where believers share with one another.

Why don't you think the bridesmaids were chided for not being more generous? Why do you think the bridesmaids were wise for not sharing? [If they had, there wouldn't have been enough for any of them.]

How does the last verse help us interpret the parable? [It makes Jesus' point for telling the parable clear: Disciples are called to be ready at a moment's notice and are to make proper preparations.]

A "shout at midnight" is a surprise announcement. What does it look like to be prepared spiritually? What habits might help you be more prepared spiritually? How can this group help you be more prepared?

#### Let us Pray:

Gracious God, we trust that you are at work reconciling the world to yourself even now and even when we may not see it. Give us the eyes of faith to see and continue empowering us to be prepared to be your witnesses to all we may encounter this coming week. Amen.



November 15, 2020

#### Read Matthew 25:14-30

#### The Parable of the Bags of Gold

14 "Again, it will be like a man going on a journey, who called his servants and entrusted his wealth to them. 15 To one he gave five bags of gold, to another two bags, and to another one bag,[a] each according to his ability. Then he went on his journey. 16 The man who had received five bags of gold went at once and put his money to work and gained five bags more. 17 So also, the one with two bags of gold gained two more. 18 But the man who had received one bag went off, dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. 19 "After a long time the master of those servants returned and settled accounts with them. 20 The man who had received five bags of gold brought the other five. 'Master,' he said, 'you entrusted me with five bags of gold. See, I have gained five more.' 21 "His master replied, 'Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!' 22 "The man with two bags of gold also came. 'Master,' he said, 'you entrusted me with two bags of gold; see, I have gained two more.' 23 "His master replied, 'Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!' 24 "Then the man who had received one bag of gold came. 'Master,' he said, 'I knew that you are a hard man, harvesting where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered seed. 25 So I was afraid and went out and hid your gold in the ground. See, here is what belongs to you.' 26 "His master replied, 'You wicked, lazy servant! So you knew that I harvest where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered seed? 27 Well then, you should have put my money on deposit with the bankers, so that when I returned I would have received it back with interest. 28 "'So take the bag of gold from him and give it to the one who has ten bags. 29 For whoever has will be given more, and they will have an abundance. Whoever does not have, even what they have will be taken from them. 30 And throw that worthless servant outside, into the darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'

Does the master in this parable seem fair? Or does he seem harsh? Why is that the case?

Since wealth was not easily obtained in those days, people who did have wealth had an easier time making a profit. It

would have been fairly easy to turn a profit even with small amounts of resources.

Why do you think the last person portrays the master the way he does? [Notice the master is fairly generous by entrusting the slaves with lots of resources, and he invites them to enter his joy. The last slave is the only one who portrays the master as harsh.]

Does this change your assumption about the fairness of the master in the parable? Why or why not?

What might it mean to "enter into the joy of the master" in verses 21 and 23?

How does this passage connect to last week's passage? [Both are about acting wisely. Last week's passage was about acting wisely with our time. This passage is about acting wisely with our stewardship.]

It is an oversimplification to equate talents and money in this parable. Certainly, Jesus is not equating the amount of wealth one has or doesn't have with being blessed. Why do you think we often connect those? [It is easy to focus on material objects.]

What do you think truly being blessed looks like? [Being blessed concerns relationships and fruit of the spirit.]

How does the world define joy? [Accumulating things; financial success] How would you define joy?

How might you be intentional in looking for joy this week?

#### Let us Pray:

God of joy, we confess the temptation to look first at what we are lacking instead of seeing your abundance. Help us to be more aware of how you have provided for us that we might experience joy in unexpected places. Guide our thoughts that we might focus on your grace, your beauty, and your mercy. Amen.



November 22, 2020 Read Matthew 25:31-46

#### The Sheep and the Goats

31 "When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, he will sit on his glorious throne. 32 All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate the people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. 33 He will put the sheep on his right and the goats on his left. 34 "Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. 35 For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, 36 I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in

prison and you came to visit me.' 37 "Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? 38 When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? 39 When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?' 40 "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.' 41 "Then he will say to those on his left, 'Depart from me, you who are cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. 42 For I was hungry and you gave me nothing to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, 43 I was a stranger and you did not invite me in, I needed clothes and you did not clothe me, I was sick and in prison and you did not look after me.' 44 "They also will answer, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or needing clothes or sick or in prison, and did not help you?' 45 "He will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me.' 46 "Then they will go away to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life."

What is the difference between the sheep's and the goats' responses in verses 37 and 44? [Notice that the first response is longer and always positive; whereas, the second is shorter and in the negative – "did not take care of you?".] What was the difference between how the "sheep" lived compared with how the "goats" lived? [The preaching notes observe that the goats lived in a way more about passing the test; whereas, the sheep lived a life of servanthood to any in need.]

How does this passage connect with the previous two week's passages? [The first week's passage was about acting wisely with our time; the second week's passage was about acting wisely concerning stewardship. Generally speaking, this passage is about seeing the needs of others (seeing all the people) and responding (wisely and responsibly) to the needs of all. It also connects with the first passage by the invitation of the master - entering into the joy of the master. Here the invitation is to enter the glory of Christ. In the second week's passage, those who invested wisely were rewarded. In today's passage, those who invest their lives wisely are invited into the glory of the kingdom.]

#### Let us Pray:

Compassionate God, we give you thanks for your abiding presence with us. Guide us to be more aware of opportunities to see you in the face and needs of those we encounter. Empower us to be focused on being your servants with and to all people that we might experience your glory. Amen.
